## Sermon:

Paul's injunction to the Christians in Philippi: "Have this mind among yourselves which is yours in Christ Jesus ... have the same mind as Christ had... think of others first and esteem others better than yourself".

No philosopher of men, even one who believed in the divine, would ever accept the idea of the divine becoming human in order to serve humanity, let alone die, and particularly let alone die FOR that humanity!

And no man would ever have worked it out...or even dreamed of it. In fact we didn't!

We saw a man, we start with him, the man Jesus of Nazareth:

- a simple man, poor, well regarded by his other villagers
- he lived simply, taught simply but powerfully
- friend of publicans and sinners
- the common people heard him gladly. They said "No man ever taught like this man"

... Who said "I am the good shepherd....I know my own and my own know me! For this reason My Father loves me, because I lay down my life for the sheep... No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord."

... Who steadfastly set his face to go to Jerusalem; who went to the Cross, fully knowing what lay before him.

He had several times told his disciples wat would happen to him at Jerusalem!

But they didn't appear to hear him...it was as if they *could not* hear!

He was transfigured on that mountain – was that a "flash-back" to his former glory....or a presentiment – a glimpse of his *coming* glory, as he discussed with Moses and Elijah the *exodus* that he was to *accomplish* at Jerusalem! (Luke 9:31)

... Who rode into Jerusalem on that special day – a King of his kingdom – consciously fulfilling the prophecy of Zechariah 9:9, on his foal of a donkey. And they shouted that day – as he said, the stones would have cried out if they did not! But as his entry then proclaimed, he was on about a mission of peace for the world, which many marchers on Palm Sunday around the world do not fully understand. He is the Prince of peace – there is *only* true peace on <u>his</u> terms!

He approached the place of his "last battle" saying – what shall I say, "father save me from this hour? NO. For this purpose I came to this hour...Father glorify your name". His Father agreed "I have glorified it and will glorify it again." Jesus said "Now is the judgement of this world – now shall the ruler of this world be cast out; and I, when I am lifted up.., will draw all men to myself!"

For those shouting that day did not <u>know</u> the things that make for peace!

As if that needed to be shown, soon they would be shouting just as loudly for his death!

Humanity did not understand what happened on that horrific Cross.



Some cried "He saved others, himself he cannot save"... (of course not, he was too busy saving them). His disciples said "God forbid – this will never happen to you!"

The High Priest had said "It is expedient that one man die for the people" understanding nothing of which he spoke. (But God took the words and made them a great prophecy.)

This is the one who was for a little while made lower than the angels...."so that by the grace of God he might taste death for every one"

And so he did – he more than tasted it – he drank it to the dregs!

He tasted not only the first death, but the second, that which gives death its sting! He tasted the *judgment* that was to come, the final accounting for sin, that which keeps all men in bondage to fear of death.

For he bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. He "became" sin for us. The Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

So we see these things, only dimly understanding, for the witnesses on the day understood very little. Till the Apostles burst on the scene, filled with the promised Holy Spirit, who brought to their understanding all the things that had been really accomplished on that day.

So that Paul could say "…have this mind in you which is yours in Christ Jesus, who though he had the prerogatives of deity, did not count equality with God a thing to be hung on to, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. "He laid his glory by, he wrapped him in our clay…" So the word became flesh!

And having become man, he humbled himself limiting himself deliberately, restricting himself to a man's dimension including in mind and body, and by living a life of utter obedience, even to the extent of dying the death of a common criminal. Therefore God has now lifted him high, and honoured him above anyone or any thing, so that at the name of Jesus, every knee shall bow, whether in heaven or earth, or under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

He will forever be a man... he died as man for men There is therefore now glorified humanity standing at the right hand of God.

So he esteemed us better than himself – this is his mind, which we are to emulate! Only love (*agape* love) could do that, or would!

He said once "A new commandment I give unto you, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no man than this – that a man will lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends if you do what I have commanded you.

How can we love like that? Only through the miracle when we are justified through faith, rejoicing in our hope of sharing the glory of God...in our eternal hope, in which God's love has been poured into our hearts by the holy Spirit which has been given to us. We know we have passed out of death into life because we love the brethren. The Apostles knew it, and we can know it too! Amen.
