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PRAYERS FOR THE WORLD:

<u>Focus</u>: Nagorno- Karabakh—this is a region claimed by both Armenia and Azerbaijan in the Caucasus mountains. Over the last 10-15 years conflict has made life a misery for the Christian population, as Armenia (poor and surrounded by Islam) has fought Azerbaijan, supported also by the massive Turkish military, to exhaustion (both physical and financial). At present Christians are fleeing Nagorno to an unknown future with little resources (see page 8 of the current Barnabas Magazine. Barnabas, of course, is helping with financial assistance to many families.

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Another story --- another Barnabas positive outcome.

A couple of years back the small Prospect Hill congregation decided to support the Brick kiln kids in Pakistan. We are now hearing about that ministry. Please check out the situation in Pakistan where Brick Kiln kids now have opportunities and support over the last few years, thanks to Barnabas. Prospect Hill church made an effort to support the brick kiln kids whose plight really hit home to the dairying community. They continue to support Barnabas because it gets to the centre of problems with (sometimes small) things- like roof repairs, or school books, cooking pots or shoes.

BIBLE READINGS:

Mark 9: 31—36

He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and he must be killed, and after three days rise again. He spoke plainly about this, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him.

But when Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, he rebuked Peter. "Get thee behind me, Satan!" he said. "You do not have in mind the concerns of God, but merely human concerns."

Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said. "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save their life, will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it. What good is it to gain the whole world, yet to forfeit your soul?"

Philippians 2: 1—8

So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any incentive of love, being in full accord and of one mind, do nothing from selfishness or conceit, but in humility count others better than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which you have in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form he humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross.

MESSAGE:

We lived for a while in South Korea. One of the first things we needed to get our head around (apart from the language!) was the local currency. It was called the Won and there were at the time 400 Won to the Australian dollar, so to buy any big items you needed a



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wheelbarrow. Like it is now in Argentina. But one gets used to it because we like to eat and to live etc. And, lets face it, money is power in our world, and power is much sought after.

The Russian parliament discussed in 2022 during a "debate" on Russian values that denial of the value of family, and advocacy of a child free lifestyle and the popularisation of non-traditional sexual relations, were as dangerous for Russia as extremism, drugs and crime. (The "Australian" 21/7/22). No mention of power there. How things have changed!

Lent has always prompted thoughts around Jesus' last week--- Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, etc. There was a time when I could attend ceremonies at especially Anglican or Catholic churches where the focus was on the Passion of Christ, perhaps more so than I had been used to in my Methodist upbringing. In that week there was no place for power!

Jesus time and again is clear about his destination.

That's what Peter had trouble grasping. You would think after three years with Jesus he would have known better. But the desire to have it our way lingers long in us. So it did with Peter. Deep down he still wanted that King David style of saviour – sword in hand, stallion beneath, riding down the Roman soldiers, leading the army, taking control. Power aplenty!

The sad thing about the human story – and maybe the church's story, is that the temptation to use power, even God's, has always been strong, even irresistible.

Paul's message to the church in Philippi is that Jesus did not grasp the power he had access to but remained committed to the ministry of giving and serving (V. 8). Power is an easier way to go — we can pursue power and long for influence. Power gets things done, authority is addictive (I've been there), but the cross has the opposite message.

Jesus had been clear about his chosen way. It was NOT to be the currency of power or greed. Remember his response in the temple (John 2:13—22). He chose the way of the servant, the currency of humility. Poor Peter seemed unable to grasp that concept. I wonder if we would have been any different?

When confronted with the choice between power and love Jesus did not convert stones into bread, jump from tall buildings, or chase after the wealth and power of this world, but gave himself to the hard task of love.

In God's kingdom, power and greatness are not virtues. Being the servant of others is. Power is not the currency. Humility is.

Henri Nouwen writes in his Messianic essay about two rabbis discussing the coming Messiah. Rabbi one asks the question: "When WILL the messiah come?" Rabbi two says "He is already here! - he's sitting outside the city with others, attending to their wounds." Rabbi one: "How will I know him then?" Rabbi two: "Look for the one binding wounds one at a time, saying, "I must be ready to help others, then I will bind my own wounds, I must be ready to respond."



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The currency of care. The call of the servant..... It's not an easy call as the challenge to us echoes "Take up your cross and follow me". What is our cross? What part of our nice, comfy, life needs to be denied?

Easter is a reminder to us all that for all the temptations and allure of power, it is a powerless Jesus, committed to the hard task of love, that we follow and serve.
